The First Day

This Is What Will Happen

At 8.45am, Miss Murray, Mr Smith, your new tutor and the prefects will meet you in the playground. There will only be Year Seven students, teachers and Year Eleven prefects in school until 11am. You will be taken to your tutor room by your tutor and prefects, and will spend the morning together. In your tutor group will be some pupils you already know from Junior School, and lots of others you can begin to make friends with.

Once in your tutor-room, your tutor will get you ready for the week ahead. You'll be given your timetable. This will tell you the names of your teachers for each subject and the rooms where the lessons will take place. You will also get a map of the school and will be taken on a tour of the school to find the rooms where you'll have lessons. You will be given a homework diary (which is also where you'll keep a record of your merits). During the morning, the whole of Year Seven will meet for an assembly.

There will be a morning break of 30 minutes. The prefects for your tutor group will show you where you should go and what to do at break-time. They will show you where the toilets are, and make sure you find your way back to your tutor-room at the end of break.

Your tutor will then tell you more about how the school works. You need to know what the school rules are, and what every teacher will expect of you in the classroom. You will also want to know about arrangements for school dinners, sandwiches and packed-lunches. Third lesson will then begin. Your tutor will help you find your way to your first lesson. This is the final lesson of the morning.

For the first two weeks of term, Year 7 pupils will go to lunch at 1.00pm, before the rest of the school. You will have the dining hall all to yourselves. Your class teacher will take you there.

Each day, prefects will be in the playgrounds at lunchtime to see how their tutor-groups are getting on, and to make sure they find their way back to the tutor-room at the end of lunchtime.

By then you will be ready for your last lesson. The day will end at 3.15pm. Your first day at King John will then be over.

Who's Who?

Your Form Tutor

This is the person who will register you in the morning. If you have any queries this is the first person that you speak to. Your tutor room is usually your tutor's main teaching room. Remember to arrive promptly for registration or you will be marked late.

Your Learning Co-ordinator

This is Miss Murray. She is in charge of the Form Tutors and she also organises all the students in Year 7. She takes a special interest in your academic progress and behaviour, both good and bad! She also contacts your parents when necessary.

Assistant Learning Co-ordinator

This is Mr Smith. He assists Miss Murray with the students in Year 7.

Year 7 Student Support Officer

Mrs Campey is the Year 7 Student Support Officer. She is located in Student Services and is able to deal with any Year 7 enquiries from you or your parents. She is your and your parents first point of contact! Should you need to see her that's where you will find her!

Cashless Catering



Planner & School Books

All your school books are under your control when you are told to hand them in. 





The King John School is full of opportunities. If you concentrate and work hard you can achieve great things.

Right from your first week, your teachers will give out merit marks. These are awarded for a particularly good piece of work, for effort, or for making an obvious improvement to your work. Teachers record them for you in the back of your homework diary. The object is to get enough merits to get a badge and a certificate, and then move up the ladder to the next merit badge.

The stages are as follows:

At the end of Year 8, the boy and girl with the most merits are awarded a Shield with their name engraved (the Shield is returnable).

All Certificates are signed by our Headteacher, Miss Wilson.

There is nothing like walking up to the front of the assembly and receiving an award. You feel really proud. The ultimate award for any year is the Academic Trophy or the Endeavour Trophy. These trophies are given to the one pupil in each year who has made the best progress or effort overall (out of over 300 pupils). One of them could be yours to keep forever!

CHARITY EVENTS

The form of Charity events at King John has changed over recent years. However, the enthusiasm shown and the great

fun had by pupils remains the same. Our charity portfolio has widened and we now raise even more money for a whole range of charities and organisations. Pupils have, through their fundraising, gained an in-

creasing awareness of working with the wider community. Pupils can appreciate and empathise with the lives and different cultures of others.

In Year Seven pupils each tutor group has a charities representative. Along with the tutor group they organise and run their own Christmas Bazaar. Funds raised in the past have helped the RSPCA, NSPCC and, recently, St Francis Hospice in Hornchurch. The money collected has also been pledged to help cancer sufferers, and their families. Some of the funds raised have gone towards computer equipment for the Atlantis School in South Africa. Each year, the bazaar supports various charities.

As a school we have raised money for the Marie Curie Trust and read "Daffodils" by William Wordsworth. The Modern Languages Department translated the poem into French and Spanish. The school also has close links to the Barnardos organisation and we support their charity work.





In the past we have raised funds for The Red Cross. We donated food to the "Harvest for the Hungry" Appeal. The King John School pupils provided 42 boxes of sugar, flour and pasta to be distributed by the charity to those in need.

We have also donated money to the Children's Hospice "Little Haven", to Guide Dogs for the Blind and to the Cystic Fibrosis Trust. One member of the Boys' PE staff even had his legs shaved to raise money for charity - there were long queues of pupils eager to watch this event!



Teaching and other school staff regularly take part in the Macmillan Cancer Trust Coffee Mornings in the Staffroom.

Through Citizenship classes we support the Basildon Women's Refuge and often invite speakers from this and other voluntary organisations into school to tell us about their work.

We plan to continue to extend our charity activity next year.

The King John Library



In the Main School Library we have over twelve thousand books. This figure when broken down reads a 1,688 reference books, 630 Young Adult books,

Years seven, eight, and nine can borrow two books each, while years ten and eleven can borrow four. This is due to the increase in homework and GCSE coursework.

The Library is fully automated each pupil is given a four-figure number in year seven, which is their personal number until they leave the sixth form in year thirteen. The computer system 'Autolib' records every book taken out during their time at school.

Each book is entered on the library database with as many keywords as necessary . This could be as many as twelve.

The search and find database at present holds nearly thirty eight thousand keywords. For example, in the fiction section we have the following keywords relating to genre. Science fiction, Romance, Humorous, Historical fiction, Mystery, Fantasy and Adventure.

While in the non-fiction books we assume the Dewey Decimal System i.e. numerical. This is the same arrangement used by most public libraries within the British Isles.

The Main school library remains open after school Monday to Thursday for three quarters of an hour: in this time pupils can select books and use the computers for educational work. It also opens before school at 8am for pupils in Year 7.

Thursday the library hosts Reading Club: this club runs for one hour, and finishes at four thirty. For security reasons we must ask for written parental consent for every club that continues after the end of a normal school day.











YEAR 7 COMMON ROOM Year 7 students have their very own

common room. This is where they can go at lunchtimes and meet their friends and socialise.

There are games—an X-Box and DVD's in this room, so there is always something to do!

You may just want to go in there to sit and chat.

On a Thursday each tutor group take it in turns to organise 'Thoughtful

Thursday" which is charity event to raise money for the year groups chosen Charity.



You have forgotten an item you need for school, such as your PE kit or homework.

If you remember before school starts, and someone is at home who can bring it in, use the payphone at school to ring home. If your parents bring the missing item to school make sure your name is on it. Tell them to bring it to student services. If you still do not have the item tell your teacher the problem at the beginning of the lesson.

You need to leave school for a dental or medical appointment.

Bring a letter explaining this from your parents to show your teacher. You need to take this letter to Student Services with you when you sign out before leaving. Remember to sign in again when you return.

You leave your packed lunch at home and haven't any money to buy lunch at school.

See your tutor of Head of Year and explain the problem.

You lose something in school

Retrace your steps and look where you last had it. Ask your teacher if they have seen it. Ask the caretaker if it is in the lost property. If you still cant find it, tell your tutor.

You do not feel well.

Tell your teacher who may decide to send you to see the medical assistant. If it is in lunchtime, find a teacher or go to the medical assistant. If you go to the medical assistant during lessons you must have a not or lesson pass from your teacher.

Someone keeps pestering you.

Tell someone, preferably your tutor, as soon as possible. If this happens at break or lunchtime, tell the nearest teacher. Do Not Keep It To Yourself.

You fall out with your friends.

Try to sort it out among yourselves at first. If this does not work, ask your tutor to help you.

You arrive late for school.

Go to the student services and tell them you have arrived. They will show you where to sign into school on the late sheet.

You haven't done your homework.

See your teacher as soon as possible. Tell the teacher that you haven't done the work, apologise and explain that you will give it in as soon as you can. You must expect to be given a detention, though.

You get lost in school and cannot find the room you need.

Ask anyone you see who looks older. King John pupils are friendly and Year Sevens do get lost in the first week or two.

Remember we have all been new too24!


